Math Science Center of Innovative Learning



Chadron State College and the Foundation are committed to ensuring the Math Science project can meet the requirements for STEM education at CSC. This \$32.1 million renovation and new construction will drastically change the landscape of not only the Chadron State campus, but for generations of future Eagles. The fifty-year-old facility has also been renamed the Math Science Center of Innovative Learning as part of its transformation. A major

Commencement Speakers... Both Chadron State college commencement speakers, Dr. Richard Koza '73, MS '80, MBA '93, and Dr. Merlin Butler '75, shared insights based on their experiences with CSC students earnings master's and bachelor's graduates degrees.

Butler said the unprecedented environment of the COVID-19 pandemic will likely add to making the event memorable. "Other graduates in the past faced great concerns, too: polio outbreaks, world war, financial collapse, global flu, cold war and Middle East crisis and conflicts. In spite of those external events, or perhaps heightened by them, those graduates will always remember their graduation day. As will you. It is an important milestone on your life's journey," Butler said.



"Be a continuous learner. Learning should never stop. One of my early memories is being in Boy Scouts. Our motto was 'Be Prepared.' That is a very powerful statement. Are you ready to perform any task in any situation? Being prepared sets the stage for your day and your life," Koza said.

CSC Golf Classic Returns... The CSC Golf Classic Don Beebe Tournament returned over Memorial Day weekend after a COVID hiatus last year. Dawes County farm boys Marle Smith, Charles Anderson, and Gordon Pinney were all prisoners in World War II and spoke to an audience in October 2001.



It's been 56 years since he was a

prisoner of war, but Charles Anderson said he still jumps out of bed when he hears a noise at night. He survived the atrocities while more than 400,000 Americans who served in World War II didn't. He weighed just 85 pounds when he was liberated by British forces, 350 days after he had been captured. Anderson had been a tailgunner on a B-17 that was shot down during a raid over Berlin in spring of 1944. After he was liberated, he was sent to the Lucky Strike transportation camp in France. After the war, Anderson returned to ranch near Oral, South Dakota.
