Math Science Center of Innovative Learning

Chadron State College and the Foundation are committed to ensuring the Math Science project can meet the requirements for STEM education at CSC. This \$32.1 million renovation and new construction will drastically change the landscape of not only the Chadron State campus, but for generations of future Eagles. The fifty-year-old facility has also been renamed the Math Science Center of Innovative Learning as part of its transformation. A Friday to Remember... Chadron State College students and employees were directed to evacuate campus Friday, February 4th, after receiving an anonymous call that a bomb was on college property. After a search by law enforcement the campus was declared safe to reopen at 7:47 p.m. that evening.

"I am thankful for the Chadron Police Department, Chadron Volunteer Fire Department, Dawes County Sheriff's Office, the Nebraska State Patrol, and Campus Security. All of those individuals worked conscientiously and had the same goal of returning campus to a safe state," said CSC President Randy Rhine. "Even though the threat was not valid, we acted appropriately and I am thankful no one was hurt." 

The following is an excerpt entitled "Started With \$26" from Lyle Fitch's "Depression Days Were No Bed of Roses" series.



"...It was the time of the Great

Depression, and most of us were desperately poor. I started college \$26 savings and made out with a scholarship that paid all my fees and book rentals, odd jobs and modest subventions from my family. The second year I got one of the prized maintenance jobs and became self-supporting. These jobs were awarded for scholarly achievement and athletic prowess. The eggheads had as their preserve the Administration Building and the library; the jocks had the gymnasium and the training school.

"My job was janitor for the west end of the main floor and basement of the Administration Building. Wages were 25 cents per hour, and we were expected to put in 20 hours per week, including sweeping out at night, dusting furniture in the morning, and scrubbing and waxing floors, washing windows, etc., on weekends. The proceeds about paid for room and board, with a little over if you didn't spend a dollar a week for breakfast."

Scholarships make education attainable and allow recipients to focus on their studies at Chadron State College. *In Their Words* demonstrates the impact scholarships make in students' lives.


