In partnership with other campus organizations and local agencies, our Title IX Coordinator also hosted **26** programs with about **941** attendees.

During the year, **52** cases were managed and **32** resulted in no formal complaint.

CARE TEAM

The CARE Team opened and managed **185** cases, supporting **157** unique students.

Most of the time, our team met with students 1-1. Sometimes, a student was contacted by email or phone call.

Of the cases managed, **sixty eight percent** were resolved.

The CARE Team supports students with losses of loved ones, family concerns, mental health concerns and a variety of other challenges.

EAGLE MENTORS

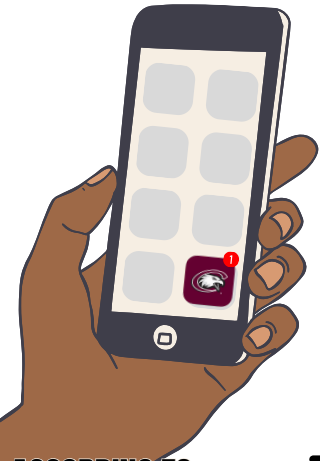
Our mission is to support incoming students in their transition to CSC using peer mentors (Eagle Mentors) to aid in social development and encourage engagement in campus activities.
